Accomplishments include 100% college acceptance for the graduating class, the opening of the Center for Collaborative Arts and the world premiere of Imagined Worlds

BALTMORE (May 14, 2015) – As the school year winds down, Baltimore School for the Arts (BSA) celebrates all of the year's successes including a **100 percent college acceptance rate** for the graduating class and a **Best High School** distinction from *U.S. News & World Report*. These achievements, along with the opening of the Center for Collaborative Arts and the world premiere of the *Imagined Worlds*, cap off the school's 35th anniversary.

"We want every BSA student to have great choices as they develop their future," said BSA Director Dr. Chris Ford. "To get there we provide young people with intensive, pre-professional training in the arts combined with rigorous, college preparatory curriculum. Through innovative classes and programs coupled with dedicated and creative faculty, we are able to help continue moving our students and our school into a bright future."

Each year, BSA's **graduation rate is 97 percent or higher** and this year will be no exception. Students received acceptance letters from some of the nation's best universities including Brown University, Eastman School of Music, Johns Hopkins University, The Juilliard School, Manhattan College, Peabody Institute, Swarthmore College and Yale University.

BSA's 35th anniversary was filled with milestones including:

- The opening of its new Center for Collaborate Arts and Technology (CCAT), which offers 16 workstations equipped with advanced software from all arts-related fields. Funded with partners including the JS Plank and Dana DiCarlo Family, the France-Merrick, and Pearlstone Family Foundations, the CCAT fosters collaborative work and links student experiences with the working world.
- BSA's free after-school program, TWIGS, served more than 700 elementary and middle school children. New this year was a partnership with the Boys

- & Girls Clubs of Metro Baltimore in which 50 low-income children received music and theatre classes.
- 3,000 kids saw free performances of The Nutcracker at The Modell Lyric and/or attended dance and opera matinees at BSA.
- The world premiere of Imagined Worlds which featured 3-D video mapping, original orchestral and vocal music and dance, as well as student-created performances, brought innovative work and nationally recognized young artists to Baltimore.
- The school's annual Expressions fundraiser raised half a million dollars to support BSA's combined academic and arts education.
- Student accomplishments include a National Merit Scholarship winner; four YoungArts winners; a selection for Center Stage's 2015 Young Playwright's Festival; a winner in the Words on Wheels poetry competition, which will display the poem on MTA buses; a sweep of the top three spots at the Laurel Choral Arts Society Vocal Competition and more!
- BSA alumni continue to distinguish themselves in the arts both locally and nationally. Artist Sara VanDerBeek is featured at the Baltimore Museum of Art; actor Lance Williams is starring with Patti LuPone in the new Jerry Zaks play; dancers Jacqueline Green and Keenan English are headliners at Alvin Ailey and Dance Theatre of Harlem.

"It's been another incredible school year where our faculty and students set, meet and even beat their goals," said Ford. "We look forward to continuing the school's successes for many years to come."
